Upcoming elections:




- In Nov. 2012, <u>5,984</u> state legislative seats will be up for elections in <u>86</u> state legislative chambers in <u>44</u> states.
- Will bring $\underline{1/3}$ new legislative leaders, committee chairs, members staff = new information needs and policy opportunities emerge.

» Juvenile crime rate down





- » New and better research available
- » Current economic climate
- » Shift -- treating young offenders as kids -- not adults
- » Pendulum, swinging back







Federal Standards: U.S. Supreme Court Rulings

 Death Penalty for juveniles abolished (Roper v. Simmons, 2005)



 Juveniles and Life Without Parole (JLWOP) for non-homicide crimes abolished (Graham v. Florida, 2010)

 In 2012, the Court ruled that mandatory JLWOP sentences unconstitutional (*Miller v. Alabama*)


 Laws Expanding Jurisdiction of Juvenile Court – raise the age

#2: Due Process and Procedural Issues






Legal Counsel

- Realignment strategies moving fiscal resources away from corrections and reinvested in communitybased alternatives





#4: Treating Mental Health Needs of Juvenile Offenders



Enacted legislation related to juvenile mental health between 2001 and 2011

- 33 states



#5:Detention and Corrections Reform



 States laws exploring ways to reduce the unwarranted detention of certain juveniles and provide meaningful alternatives to detention



Gender-Responsive Programming Statutes










#6: Disproportionate Minority Contact







#7: Reentry/Aftercare

 Every year 100,000 juveniles are released from confinement; 2/3 of incarcerated youth were convicted for nonviolent offenses



- Laws have worked to improve post-release supervision, supports and help to juveniles for successful transitions home
 - At least half of the states have passed such laws in the past decade
- Confidentiality of Juvenile Records and Expungement
